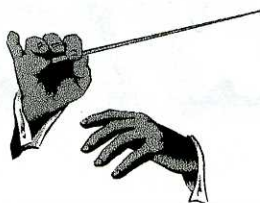

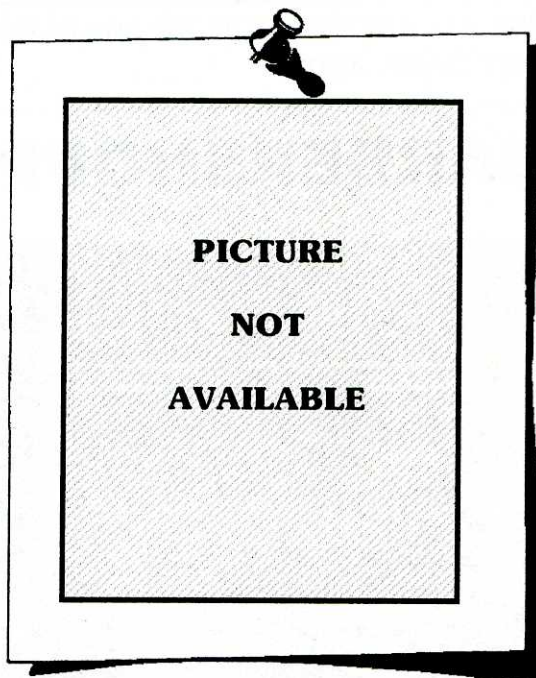
One of the very first things that any audience member can hear is whether the sounds being produced are "in tune". So what do we mean when we say IN TUNE?

I can tell you that the very first thing that distracts me when I listen to any group perform, is out of tune singing. As singers, we strive to achieve precise intonation, both melodic and harmonic, to ensure that the tonal center is maintained and that our feeling of "lock and ring" is maximized. That probably sounds like a bunch of "mumbo jumbo" to many of you. Let me explain....

As barbershop singers, we strive for more precise tuning than is possible with the fixed 12-tones-per-octave that we are familiar with when plunking out all of the notes between, let's say "C" and "C" on a piano. What we tend to do is to adjust pitches inside of chords to make them "ring" – this is called "harmonic intonation". We do it naturally as good ear singers. Many times we hear a chord and lift our shoulder willing it to tune. Will alone won't do it – we need to know if we should be adjusting our tone to be slightly sharper or flatter – so, when you are told to shim a note by a couple of onion skins, you'll now know that it's to better tune a chord.

Keeping the key feeling throughout a song refers to keeping the tonal center constant and re-establishing it through any modulation. "Melodic intonation" refers to the way that we sing the melody to make sure that the tonal center, or feeling of the song's key is maintained. As just one example, when we ask you to "lift" the tone when you are hanging one out, it's to ensure that

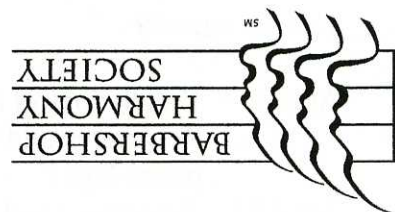
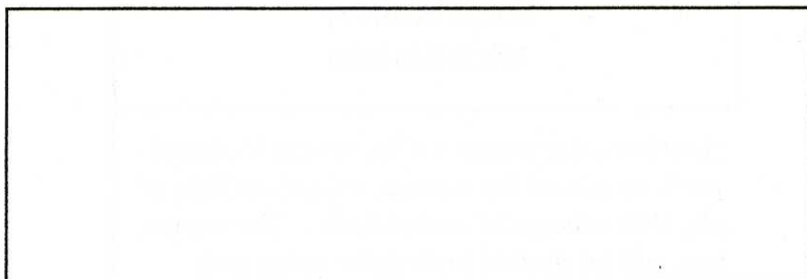
